

SOCIAL EMOTIONAL LEARNING (SEL)

- Mindfulness practices can be a way to empower students to monitor their own wellness and stress levels
- Naming Objects: Coping strategy to manage stress, anxiety
- Making is inherently mindful
 - Consider your body when you are in the maker zone

- Any materials that have natural fibers at the heart of making the art: stitching, felting, weaving, knitting, crochet, hand-made paper making,
- Textile art is similar and in some cases used interchangeably. <u>Good</u> <u>blog discussion</u>

BOOTCAMPS: TIME TO PLAY

Fiber Arts Station Directions

- Felting and Embroidery are two examples of fibers-based mark-making. The use of thread, wool or silk to create color marks through a series of wet felting, dry felting or stitched marks is part of what is involved
- Dry Felting: Involves choosing fibers and overlaying them on a piece of fabric 2. or foam and then needling the fibers together to bond them into a new surface called felt. The felting needles are really sharp so you need to be very careful. How do you know it is finished? This is a matter of taste, but you want the felted surface to be bonded together with little to no fuzzy fibers sticking up. These are photos of Jaana Mattson's process.











BOOTCAMPS: HOW TO ORGANIZE

- Determine how long the rotations will be at each station
- Do they spend a full class period at one?
- Do they rotate to 2 stations a period?
- Must stay at station the entire time
- Collect everything you make, no judgements
- Handouts to reinforce the learning and process with QR codes for video
- Pre-teach the process, but make them do the research....this is hard!!
- You travel from station to station to check in

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




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NEEDLE FELTING HOW TO


- The goal is to create a cohesive piece that has merged the fibers together through agitation or heat
- Two types of felting: needle felting (uses the agitation of the needle poking movement) and wet felting (uses hot water and agitation)


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NEEDLE FELTING HOW TO

- Things you need:
- Needle
- Roving (fibers)
- Foam or brush block
- Fabric or free form
- Jeanne Bjork Fiber Arts Page



- Allows you to paint a picture with threads and tell a story
- See Website for more
- Various stitches allow for variety of the mark you are making with the needle and floss
- Floss can be wool or silk or cotton based.

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
- Things you need:
- Embroidery Needle
- Floss
- Fabric-ironed flat
- Hoop if possible, could also staple or pin fabric flat

SHIBORI STITCHING: JAPANESE TIE DYE

- The stitches and binding create the pattern that is dyed into the fabric,
- The type of fabric fibers can effect the pattern and look
- Usually seen with indigo dyes, but can be made with other dye colors
- Many kimono incorporate shibori stitch and dye designs
- Stitch names and patterns are often derived from nature

Step 2- Fold, Band & Bind Step 4 - Submerge Fabric

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
Step 5 - Dyed Bundle Exposed To Oxygen
